#### Background – regular work of the Council

- National point of support for DACs and others on buildings matters
- National engagement on funding and policy
- Engagement on specific casework matters when needed (or required)
- Role in advice at time of closure/potential closure

Church Building Support Officers

Minor Repairs and Improvement Grants

Church Buildings Management Partnerships





- Church Buildings Support Officers (£3.3mn)

Employed in diocese or partner organisation

Part-funded by grant

- To provide new resource to churches
- Historic Environment Advice Apprenticeships





- Minor Repairs and Improvements (£6.2mn)

Administered by diocese

Urgent and necessary repair or improvement projects

Project cost £10k (0r £12k in unlisted building)





#### Church Buildings Management Partnerships

To set up partnership bodies to organise maintenance and insurance

Economies of scale, and shift burden from volunteers

Start-up grants of up to £10k to each diocese





#### Digital provision

- Investment in Church Heritage Record and Online Faculty System
- To build on what we have, increase functionality, modern software
- How can this support inspectors?






#### **Conservation grants programme**



#### **Distribution map**










Wingfield, St Andrew: Building on the HAR due to condition of the monuments. Grant awarded towards their conservation










Stogumber, Blessed Virgin Mary: Grant for the structural monitoring of the monument before conservation







#### Climate resilience / adaptation

- Climate adaptation and resilience is increasingly being seen as important as climate mitigation
- This covers making both our church buildings and our church communities more resilient e.g. to flooding, overheating, and storm damage
- New guidance and a dozen useful case studies shared in the last year: <u>Climate resilient church | The</u> <u>Church of England</u>
- The guidance suggests churches make a "Future Climate Action Plan" (worked example incl.)

#### CASE STUDY PROVIDING A COOL REFUGE DURING A HOT SUMMER



N.B. This case study considers only one possible approach, which will not be suitable for every church. Always seek professional advice.

#### **Key Points**

- Churches such as St Mary's Church, Ellenbrook have a high thermal mass because of their thick walls.
- Throughout the hottest days of the 2022 heatwave, St Mary's was able to maintain a cool temperature and mobilise with short notice to provide a welcoming space for their community.
- · Volunteers made extensive use of a previously installed kitchen to offer cold drinks and snacks.
- · This action generated national media attention and engaged unreached members of the local community.

#### The context

From the 16th to 19th of July 2022 the UK experienced a record breaking heatwave, putting many vulnerable people and children under risk of heat exposure. In Greater Manchester temperatures peaked at 37.7°C. Many churches across the country reacted to this crisis, including St. Mary's, Ellenbrook. The church remained open over these days as a place of refuge from the heat for the local community.






Phase 1: Every Anglican churchyard, extension and cemetery boundary in England has been digitally mapped, and heritage and ecological data is being added, from monuments to bats



Phase 2: Every PCC will be offered a free online digital plan of their churchyard(s) and church(es) and integrated scans of their Registers by our partners Atlantic Geomatics

Phase 3 (optional): The burial ground manager can update the online map, add grave reservations and new memorials, plan paths and utilities, create tours, etc






## Scanning burial (and other parish) records at County Record Office (or other diocesan repository)


