Your age and also your original home village, town or city (i.e. the place you grew up): **Answer:** I grew up in a small village called Newton Flotman in Norfolk.

Answer: There is so much more to explore with God. There is so much mystery to him, and so faith should be often seen as an adventure of holiness.

Answer: To be honest this is my first time moving to a home which is mine to live in. I've spent a long time in shared accommodation; so, for me, adapting to a more independent





way of life will give both wonderful opportunities that I've never had before, and new challenges, as I learn this new way of life.

What do you view as your most significant personal achievement? (This may be connected to your ordination training of course or it could be something else from another aspect of your life.)

Answer: Right now, for me, it is getting engaged to my amazing fiancé.
