During the 9am Mass at the Cathedral, where I was working as a virger, the hymn 'Take my life and let it be consecrated, Lord, to thee' was sung; familiar to me from my Methodist days as a child. I questioned God – thinking I was already where he wanted me – but offered myself to do his will - and asked him to make it obvious.

What has been a) the most important thing you have learned and b) the most inspiring thing you have experienced during your training? (They can be different!)

Answer: I have learnt tolerance and acceptance, patience, and perseverance with those who I train with and those who teach. Most inspiring are the people I train with – we support, encourage, learn, and laugh together.

Getting to know the parish and people I seek to serve. Learning to be the person God is calling me to be as a Deacon.
