Answer: I am 44 years old. I was born and raised in Nowshera, a city in the northwest of Pakistan.

Tell us a bit about your family:

Answer: I come from a family with deep roots in service and education. My father, a retired Archdeacon of Peshawar Diocese in Pakistan, dedicated his life to the church and community. My mother, a retired schoolteacher, now serves as the Diocesan treasurer in Peshawar Diocese. My wife, Shumaila, known as Mona, is a dedicated General Practitioner in Leigh, UK.

If applicable, what was your former job before entering ministry?

Answer: I have spent 20 years in the Church Education Sector and assisted some nongovernmental organisations during natural disasters in Pakistan. I was the Head Teacher at one of the Peshawar Diocese's oldest schools before moving to Blackpool in 2019.

Tell us something about your journey towards ordination?

Answer: My journey towards ordination has been unique and transformative. Growing up in a vicarage and serving in the diocesan education sector, the call to ordained ministry was always present in my life, yet I grappled with fear and uncertainty. Upon relocating to the UK from Pakistan in 2019, I found a spiritual home at St Paul's Church Marton in Blackpool, where I was commissioned as an Authorised Lay Minister in 2021. The Diocesan M:Power course helped me rediscover Jesus Christ as my personal Saviour and strengthen my bond with God the Father.

Guided by prayer and the Holy Spirit, encouragement and support by my Vicar in Blackpool and an Asian Missionary priest from Preston, I finally heeded God's call to ordained ministry. In September 2022, my vocational training began at Emmanuel Theological College and my placement at St. Laurence's Church Chorley; I am grateful for the spiritual growth and clarity that have marked this significant journey. As I continue to discern and prepare for ordained ministry, I am filled with a sense of purpose and peace, knowing I am following the path God has set before me.





What has been a) the most important thing you have learned and b) the most inspiring thing you have experienced during your training? (They can be different!)

- A) The most important thing I have learned during my ordained ministry is leading others by example. I have come to understand the importance of embodying Christ's teachings in my daily life and being a living example of love, compassion, and grace to those around me. This has highlighted the significance of authenticity and integrity in ministry, enabling me to inspire and make disciples by faithfully reflecting God's love.
- B) The most inspiring thing I have experienced during my training is the remarkable openness and inclusiveness within the Church of England. Witnessing the Church's commitment to welcoming all people, regardless of background, beliefs, or identity, has been truly uplifting. This emphasis on embracing diversity and fostering unity has been a powerful testament to God's grace's transformative and inclusive nature. It has encouraged me to strive for a more inclusive and welcoming ministry that reflects Christ's boundless love for all.

Using various digital tools and platforms, I aim to create a more inclusive and accessible environment for anyone seeking spiritual connection and community participation in the digital space.

What are some of the personal challenges and opportunities you face in your ministry in the coming year?

Answer:
