Answer: My journey towards ordination started with other people asking me if I had considered it before I recognised it for myself. It was through being given opportunities at my home church in Worcester and through the Blackpool Ministry Experience Scheme, that I discovered the gifts God has given me and how I might be able to use them to be a blessing to others

What has been a) the most important thing you have learned and b) the most inspiring thing you have experienced during your training? (They can be different!) **Answer for a:** The most important thing that I have learned during my training is that God has called me as me and He doesn't want me to pretend to be someone I'm not **Answer for b:** The most inspiring thing I have learned during my training is that God often shows up in the places and the people that I least expect, and it is a joy to be constantly surprised by how He's at work

This is exciting because it gives opportunity for people to be empowered to take on new responsibilities and to exercise the gifts that God has given them!

Answer: Somehow, I managed to run the Freckleton half marathon in 2022, I'm not convinced I could ever run that distance again
