What has been a) the most important thing you have learned and b) the most inspiring thing you have experienced during your training? (They can be different!)

Answer for a: I am still in training, so there may be more to come. I am inspired by the teaching from tutors at Emmanuel Theological College, their love for the Bible and their knowledge of theology is humbling.

Answer for b: The most inspiring thing is the friendship with fellow students at Emmanuel, even though we differ theologically and in the traditions of the church of England we are all united under God to help each other and to love and support each other.
