Session 3: Making disciples of Jesus Christ – Members' Handout

Bible Passage: Mark 8:34-38 (10 minutes)



³⁴ Then he called the crowd to him along with his disciples and said: 'Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. ³⁵ For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me and for the gospel will save it. ³⁶ What good is it for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul? ³⁷ Or

what can anyone give in exchange for their soul? ³⁸ If anyone is ashamed of me and my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, the Son of Man will be ashamed of them when he comes in his Father's glory with the holy angels.'

Option 1


Option 2

Money matters:



Jesus seems to indicate that one of the biggest challenges for us is around the issue of money and possessions.

'Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moth and

rust do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.'

'No one can serve two masters. Either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and Money.'

Matthew 6: 1-4, 19-21, 24-34)

The Bible talks about giving a proportion of your income to God's work. Some groups suggest giving 5% of our income to the church and others recommend following the Bible's teaching about tithing which involves giving 10% of what we have to God. Ultimately we need to decide with God what our level of giving should be. The Bible teaches that our giving to God should be realistic, planned, generous, regular and cheerful. In most churches about 85% of the time, money, energy and prayer is given by about 15% of the people. Why do you think this is?
